As we move towards the conclusion of another year of action and activity in the Rural Municipality of Morris it is appropriate to do a short review of success and significant events this past year.

The majority of municipal assessment is farmland and Council choose to add budget dollars to the 2017 road and drainage maintenance program. The long overdue repair of the Riverside Road Bridge over the Morris River was completed in 2017. The Riverside West Bridge will be rebuilt in 2018.

The 1.2 million dollar Lowe Farm lagoon project was completed in 2017. The cost of this upgrade was shared equally by the three levels of government. We received notice of grant approval for the completion of the Rosenort Industrial Park road network. The project will complete the roadway, sewer and water and drain plan and create 26 new industrial lots. The construction of a new fire hall in Rosenort was initiated in 2017 with the generous support of the community and residents and taxpayers in the RM of Morris.

In addition to continued aggressive drain maintenance program your Council will be planning for the expansion of the Rosenort lagoon and the establishment of a rural wastewater program that will include the community of Aubigny. The first stage in the development of this project will include a feasibility plan to review the cost implications of this major project.

2018 will also see your Council review the potential of providing fibre optic internet service to municipal residents. Progress reports will be available on the RM of Morris website and on our Facebook site.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the community.


We look forward to having Trevor meld this new position that we hope will provide our residents with a great new combined service. He will be located in our Administration Office, however he will also be out in the community.

When a fire occurs, there is no time to waste. That is why it is so important to sit down with your family today and make a step-by-step plan for escaping from a fire.

Draw a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of every room - especially sleeping areas. Discuss the escape routes with every member of your household. Agree on a meeting place outside your home where every member of the household will gather to wait for the fire department. This allows you to count heads and inform the fire department if anyone is trapped inside the burning building. Practice your escape plan at least twice a year. Have a fire drill in your home. Appoint someone to be a monitor and have everyone participate. A fire drill is not a race. Get out quickly, but carefully. Make your exit drill realistic. Pretend that some exits are blocked by fire and practice alternative escape routes. Pretend that the lights are out and that some escape routes are filling with smoke.



Be Prepared

Make sure everyone in the household can unlock all doors and windows quickly, even in the dark. Windows or doors with security bars need to be equipped with quick-release devices and everyone in the household should know how to use them.

If you live in an apartment building, use stairways to escape. Never use an elevator during a fire. It may stop between floors or take you to a floor where the fire is burning.

If you live in a two storey house, and you must escape from a second storey window, be sure there is a safe way to reach the ground. Make special arrangements for children, older adults and people with disabilities. People who have difficulty moving should have a phone in their sleeping area and, if possible, should sleep on the ground floor.

Test doors before opening them. While kneeling or crouching at the door, reach up as high as you can and touch the door, the knob and the space between the door and its frame with the back of your hand. If the door is hot, use another escape route. If the door is cool, open it with caution.

If you are trapped, close all doors between you and the fire. Stuff the cracks around the doors with towels or blankets to keep out smoke. Wait at a window and signal for help with a light coloured cloth or a flashlight. If there is a phone in the room, call 911 and tell the operator exactly where you are.

Get Out Fast...

In case of fire, do not stop for anything. Do not try to rescue possessions or pets. Go directly to your meeting place and then call the fire department from a neighbour's phone. Every member of your household should know how to call the fire department.

Crawl low under smoke. Smoke contains deadly gases and heat rises. During a fire, cleaner air will be near the floor. If you encounter smoke when using your primary exit, use your alternate escape plan. If you must exit through smoke, crawl on your hands and knees keeping your head 12 to 24 inches (30 to 60 cm) above the floor.

... And Stay Out

Once you are out of your home, do not go back for any reason. If people are trapped, firefighters have the best chance of rescuing them. The heat and smoke of a fire are overpowering. Firefighters have the training, experience and protective equipment needed to enter burning buildings.

Play It Safe...

More than half of all fatal home fires happen at night while people are asleep. Smoke alarms are set off when a fire starts, alerting people before they are trapped or overcome by smoke. With smoke alarms, your risk of dying in a home fire is cut nearly in half. Install smoke alarms outside every sleeping area and on every level of your home, including the basement. Test smoke alarms monthly. Change all smoke alarm batteries at least once a year. If your smoke alarm is more than 10 years old, replace it.

Reminders

Address Change: Please remember to advise the RM of Morris Office if you are moving so changes can be made to your water and tax accounts.

Outstanding Utilities: Water bills are sent out quarterly. Any accounts overdue 45 days will be transferred to your tax account.

Building Permits: Any new buildings, renovations, relocation, removals, demolitions, etc., require a permit. Permits are done at the RM of Morris Office.

Rural Residents: Please refrain from dumping or blowing snow onto road allowances. This can be dangerous for snow clearing equipment travelling at high speeds.

Parked Cars and Snow Clearing Operations: Please remove parked vehicles from the street during snow plowing or clearing operations. Parked cars not only slow the operation, but also leave large amount of snow on the road after the car is dug out, which is inconvenient for everyone and dangerous. Your valued assistance during the winter season will help provide efficient and economical winter maintenance service.

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Reminder: Check all your filters, smoke detectors, sump pumps egress window operations for trouble free winter.

Public Works Report

Drainage – The drainage program came to a halt December 18th. The spreading of dirt piles is 95% completed. There will be approx. 20 miles to carry over to 2018.

Roads – The gravel roads are all in decent condition. This year we increased the gravel quantities substantially during our spring gravelling program. Last years wet conditions took quite a toll on most of our roads. The dirt roads are shaping up quite nicely. This is an ongoing process of pulling up the shoulders so that the roads tops will shed water better.

Bridges – The Bridge on Road 28N west of Riverside is getting repaired in 3 phases this winter. Phase 1 and 2 are completed already and phase 3 will take place in Jan/Feb. This will be one more road closure until the work underneath the bridge is completed. Just a reminder that when crossing these wooden bridge structures to please slow down. The combination of weight and speed destroys these wooden bridge structures quickly.

VariouS – The RM Employees will be busy this winter replacing equipment and building various items when not out plowing snow.

Employees – Paul Robert my assistant is progressing very nicely and will take on more and more responsibility all the time.
